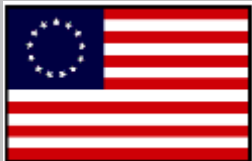

A Letter of Encouragement from George Washington

In the winter of 1775, at the siege of Boston, Mass, General Washington was sorely pressed to maintain his army. It was made up primarily of New England soldiers who had a definite enlistment date and a discharge date.

He had about 10 thousand on the rolls but only about 1000 had agreed to stay in the army. He was desperate to find a stimulus, other than patriotism, that would keep men in the army.

There were many problems from September to November 1775, especially the British shipping of 300 people from Boston on one ship, and another 150 on another ship across the bay so the rebels would have to take care of them. They were infected with smallpox. Washington stated that "it is a weapon of defense that they are using against us".

The attached letter, signed from A Freeman, was published in the New England Chronicle. (It is taken from the book, "1776", by David McCullough.)

"Your exertions in the defense of freedom, guided by wisdom and animated by zeal and courage, have gained you love and confidence of your grateful countrymen; and they look to you, who are experienced veterans, and trust that you will still be the guardians of America. As I have the honor to be an American, and one among the free millions, who are defended by your valor, I would pay the tribute of thanks, and express my gratitude, while I solicit you to continue in your present honorable and important station. I doubt not America will always find enough of her sons ready to flock to her standards, and support her freedom; but experience proves that experienced soldiers are more capable of performing the duties of the camp; and better qualified to face the enemy, than others; and therefore every friend of America will be desirous that most of the gentlemen who compose the present army may continue in the service of their country until "Liberty, Peace and Safety" are established. Although your private concerns may call for your assistance at home, yet the voice of your country is still louder, it is painful to heroic minds to quit the field when liberty calls, and the voice of injured millions cries "To arms! To arms!" Never was a cause more important or glorious than that which you are engaged in; not only your wives, your children, and distant posterity, but humanity at large, the world of mankind, are interested in it; for if tyranny should prevail in this great country, we may expect liberty will expire

throughout the world. Therefore, more human glory and happiness may depend upon your exertions than ever yet depended on any of the sons of men. He that is a soldier in defense of such a cause, need no title, his post is a post of honor, and although not an emperor, yet he shall wear a crown – of glory – and blessed will be his memory.”

After these enlistment problems were recognized, Washington started to act on them, by supplying his own money as inducement to stay. He had written to Congress about the problem and asked for the other Colonies to please send troops to Boston to fortify his army.

Up until that time the army had been called the "New England Army" which Washington did not like; neither the name, nor the soldiers who made up the New England Army. After the appeals for soldiers to the other Colonies began to get results, the name of the Army was changed to "The Continental Army" for the first time and it was known as that name for the remainder of the war.

Meritorious Service Medals

Meritorious Service Medals were presented to Compatriots Ed Karr and Robert Gordon this past summer by President General Butler. This was for service to the PG visit in November of 2009. It was the SECOND award for each (first at the national level).

Liberty Medal

Compatriot Ed Karr was awarded the Liberty Medal at the Annual Congress in June for being the first line sponsor/signer on membership applications. This meant that he was instrumental with helping applicants with their documents, etc.

Ed was given TWO Oak Leaves (his SECOND and THIRD awards). This award is only given at the national level!

Admiral William R. Furlong Award

The Furlong Award is presented to the state society for the "Flag Certificates".

Thus far COSSAR has received the award four times – 2001, 2002, 2004, and 2005.

To qualify the state society and the chapters must present Flag Certificates to a person or organization.

The U S flag must be flown according to guidelines. Examples would be to schools, veterans & fraternal groups, etc. Not to car dealers, diners, etc. that use the flag for attracting sales. This is a VERY achievable award which we should get every year.

SAR World War II Corps

In the recently published SAR newsletter on page 28 an article and form were included regarding the formation of a World War Two corps. This is being done in order to honor our nation's veterans that are SAR Compatriots.

Did you know that there are THREE awards available to military veterans? If you are a veteran that did not serve in a combat zone you are entitled to receive the "Military Service Medal".

If you are a veteran that did serve in a combat zone you are entitled to receive the "War Service Medal". Lastly, if you were wounded you are entitled to receive the "Wounded Warrior Coin."

In all three cases we need appropriate documentation. FYI – if you have already received any of these awards (say from your chapter) please let me know in order that you can be recognized via the national database.
